Opening Remarks

10th International Conference on Traditional Forest Knowledge and Culture in Asia 01 November 2017 Seoul, Korea

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Good Morning Ladies and Gentlemen,

First and foremost, allow me to express my upmost gratitude on behalf of APAFRI to Korea Society of Forest Science and National Institute of Forest Science (NIFoS) for organizing this conference in the campus of Seoul National University. We are also delighted and would like to recognize the involvement of AFoCo in this conference.

This conference is made possible largely by the generous financial contributions of NIFoS (previously known as Korea Forest Research Institute (KFRI)) to. APAFRI is honored to be entrusted with the task of managing the fund APAFRI for organizing activities in the Asia Pacific region, which had increased steadily over the years.

This conference is the 10th in the series, and APAFRI is honoured to be involved in at least three of the past conferences: the 7th in Seoul, Korea, 8th in Nanjing, China, and 9th in Bogor, Indonesia. capacity, as well as to foster the establishment of institutional and professional collaboration among the region's forestry researchers and academicians.

APAFRI is therefore honoured to be invited to join the Asia Centre for TFRK which is currently hosted by NIFoS in Seoul, Korea. As of this year, we understand that AFoCo has also accepted the invitation to be a member of the Centre. We hope to see more and more countries from the region to participate and share their experiences.

APAFRI hope to be more proactive in the years to come, and shall endeavour to extending participation of these activities to all members of APAFRI from the other sub-regions in Asia and the Pacific.
